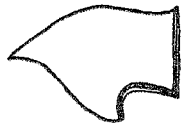

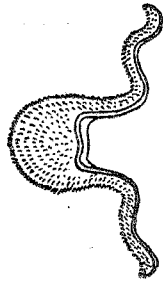
Changchub Semsha: *the kind of hat worn by any Changchub Sempa*



Gomsha: *the hat of one who is an adept in meditation*



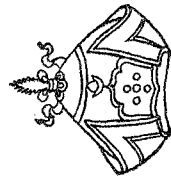

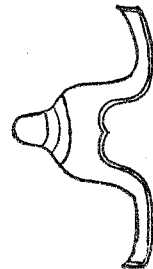

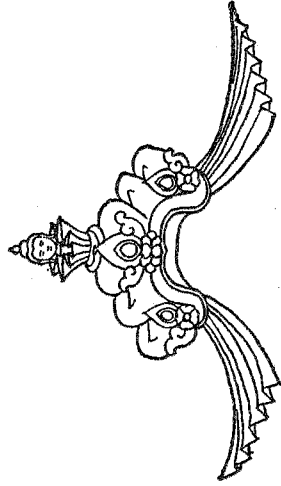
Phagmo Durpa: *hat of the leader of the Karjurpa sect*



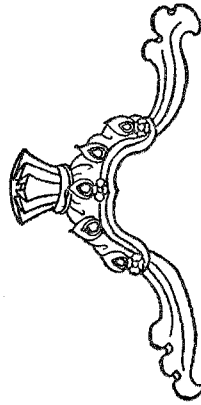

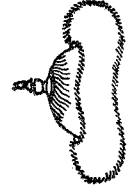
Hat worn by Srontsan Gampo and Raipalchen



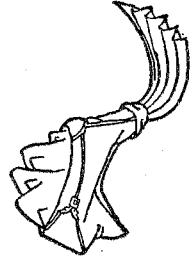

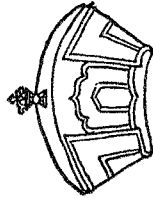

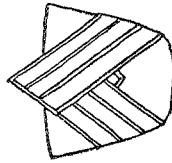

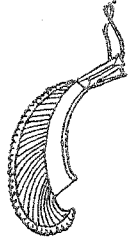

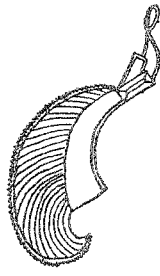
The hat of Chamchenchogyi, founder of the Sera Monastery



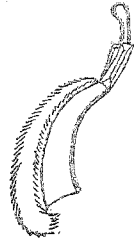
Hat worn by all leaders of the Sakya sect



Drochama: *the kind of hat that can be worn by any monk*



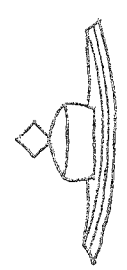
Tagdroma: *the hat worn only by monks of the Gelukpa sect*



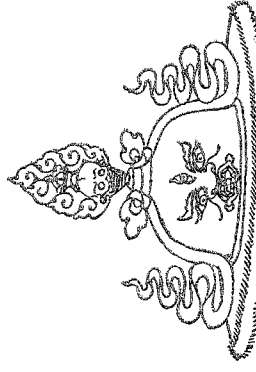
Tsogsha: *a hat worn by ordinary monks for Assembly or other special gatherings*



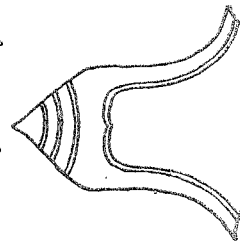
Tasha: *the winter hat of a monastic or government official*
